## Comparison of Adjectives - Steigerung der Adjektive

one-syllable adjectives: 'Germanic' comparison with er and est clean, cleaner, the cleanest

## Exceptions to the rule

- final 'y' after a consonant becomes *i*: dry, drier, the driest; Exceptions: shy, shyer, the shyest und sly, slyer, slyest.
- 2. silent 'e' is dropped: large, larger, the largest.
- 3. final consonant after short, stressed vowel is doubled hot, hotter, the hottest slim, slimmer, the slimmest

two-syllable adjectives: "French" comparison with more and most skillfull, more skillfull, the most skillfull

## Exceptions to the rule

- 1. **two-syllabic adjectives ending in -y:** busy, busier, the busiest happy, happier, the happiest ugly, uglier, the ugliest
- two-syllabic adjectives ending in -er. clever, cleverer, the cleverest.
  Exceptions: eager, proper
- two-syllabic adjectives ending in -le: gentle, gentler, the gentlest simple, simpler, the simplest
- 4. two-syllabic adjectives ending in –ow: narrow, narrower, the narrowest shallow, shallower, the shallowest.
- 5. **two-syllabic adjectives ending in –***some: handsome, handsomer, the handsomest* grue**some**, grue**somer**, *the gruesomest*
- two-syllabic adjectives with a stress on the second syllable: polite, politer, the politest – severe, severer, the severest

adjectives of three or more syllables with **more** and **most**. expensive, **more** expensive, the **most** expensive (three syllables) convenient, **more** convenient, the **most** convenient (four syllables)

## Irregular Adjectives

bad / ill	worse	the worst
little (amount)	less	the least
little (size)	smaller	the smallest
much / many	more	the most
far (place + time)	further	the furthest
far (place)	farther	the farthest
